

Year 6's Home Learning Letter

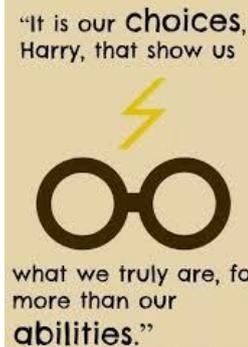

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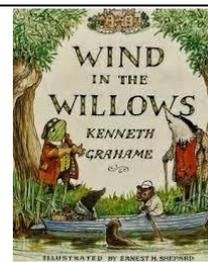

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Spelling	<p>Rule: The root words: cyclo, chrono, tract, dict, script, fac, port and struct.</p> <p>Spelling sentence: Scientists are able to extract important information and facts to predict when and where cyclones will develop. Their descriptions of the possible chronological events can help reduce the destruction they cause.</p> <p>Practise this week's spelling sentence. Try to use a range of different techniques over the week.</p>
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Reading and Writing	<p>Spend at least 30 minutes reading a book today.</p> <p>The Wind in the Willows by Kenneth Grahame – Writing Challenges https://www.gutenberg.org/files/27805/27805-h/27805-h.htm</p> <p>Using what you have learnt so far, choose one of the following three challenges to complete:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1) Write either the Mole or the Rat's diary, recounting the day's events. Think about their voice and viewpoint. How would each character write? 2) Create a menu for another riverside picnic. Use some of the food that is mentioned in the text and think about what other food might have been eaten over a hundred years ago when the book was written. 3) Use the description of the river to inspire a description of the Wild Wood, which is mentioned briefly in chapter one. This is a dark and sinister place compared to the river. Imagine one of the characters is entering the Wild Wood. Use some of the same techniques that were used to describe the river, but try to create a creepy atmosphere. Read chapter three of the book and compare your description with Kenneth Grahame's.
